# The 6<sup>th</sup> Annual Seminar on Regional Security in Central Asia

Bishkek, September 6-7, 2013

The annual two-day meeting of international experts on Central Asia is one of hallmark events at the Academy. The seminar has been running since 2008 and is a unique forum for representatives of Central Asian, European, Russian, and other policy and scholarly communities who work on matters related to comprehensive security in Central Asia.

The seminar is hosted and organized by the OSCE Academy in Bishkek jointly with the Geneva Centre for Security Policy, the Norwegian Institute of International Affairs and the Near East-South Asia Strategic Studies Center (Washington D.C.). The Seminar follows the Chatham House Rule and the summary of discussion is published as in the *Geneva Paper* series by the GSCP.

The speakers of the Seminar include distinguished regional and international policy analysts and scholars working in various parts of the world but united in their professional focus on Central Asia and its neighbourhood.

The 6<sup>th</sup> Annual Seminar in September 2013 aims to cover a range of topics on international and intraregional security dynamics, with the purpose of mapping the current and expected security trends in Central Asia in 2013 and beyond and discussing the contours of the key policy recommendations for relevant national and international actors.
